





History of the Beginning of the Hanover Arts and Activities Center

In 1967, the 41 members of the Ashland Junior Woman's Club began work on a community center that is known today as the Hanover Arts and Activities Center.

There had been concern for many years about the lack of a library, a museum, children's classes, teen events and a playground. Most of the members had small children and did not work outside the home. The club wrote a letter to the newspaper saying the old Ashland Baptist Church building was for sale and would make a great place for a library and community center. Rumors went around about a funeral home and a restaurant that were considering buying the church.

From the letter came an editorial in support of the library. Ideas flew and a light bulb went off. The church could house not only the library, but our children's theater, The Huckleberry Players, a museum, rooms for classes and civic meetings, teen areas, a playground and a home for civic organizations. We could hardly contain ourselves!

Meredith Stiles, the club President, appointed a Steering Committee to start the community center. The members were Nancy Christian, Sande Hill, Suzanne Flippo, Bonnie Darling, Audrey Reynolds, Elaine Alfano and Betty Lee Miller. We envisioned a living building with things going on all the time. On July 1, 1967, the Baptist Church moved to their new location. When the church was empty, the Steering Com-mittee met, and we had to bring a chair to sit on and a table for the meeting. We ran from room to room envi-sioning how to make the building come alive.

We had two months to come up with \$28,000. \$27,000 to purchase it and \$1,000 to pay expenses for a few months. I really don't remember anyone saying "Well, it just can't be done." The committee met and brainstormed ideas. The enthusiasm was contagious. We enlisted the help of the other club members. We received donations from businesses and other clubs. We had money-making projects. We visited private individuals who might help us and asked for money. We had a media blitz


with articles and brochures and exhibits. We held an open house with over 1,000 people attending during which we unfolded our vision and held a huge membership

drive! We came up with the money for a down payment. By December of 1968 we had raised the \$28,000 and made the final payment on the building and the land.

Members asked for help from everywhere. I remember keeping baby Rob Stiles while his mother Meredith appeared before Richmond City Counsel and asked for

> the old seats that were being replaced at the Mosque. Husbands went down in trucks to get them and the seats were used for years in the auditorium. The birth of the Center became a full time volunteer job for club members.

So many people helped us in those early years when we were raising money. The projected renovation goal was set at \$150,000 after the purchase. One person I do want to mention is Jim Pollard. There were many times when we couldn't pay the oil bill and for years Jim would say, "Pay me when you can" and we did. It was an uphill financial battle, but the enthusiasm was unmatched.



A Constitution and By-laws were written, officers elected and the flood gates opened with people to help. A Board of Directors was formed and many more members of the community stepped forward to volun-teer. We had lawyers, architects, bankers, a former college president and other professionals to help us.

The Board was an eager Blue Ribbon panel. We received help from the Jaycees, the Henry Clay Woman's Club, Kiwanis, Lions, Garden clubs, Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts. Our husbands made repairs, painted, watched children and went without supper! Our members worked for months scrubbing, cleaning, babysitting and doing any job that needed doing.

We started out having art shows, art classes, a teen center called "Out."

puppet shows, children's plays, story hours, extensive enrichment classes for young and old. We purchased playground equipment with our "Green Stamps."

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I was Education Chairman for the club, and my job for the new Hanover Arts and Activities Center Steering Committee was the library. Our education projects won us the \$1,500 total in the State and National Shell Oil Contest. Meredith Stiles and Betty Carol Stevenson flew to Boston for the General Federation of Women's Clubs International Con vention to get the award. We were the first Junior



club to ever receive the award. That money was used to build bookcases, buy materials to catalog books and to make the library come alive. We were always hoping that someday the Pamunkey library system would take over. I attended their meetings for years and our hopes finally did come true. By 1970 we had over 2,000 donated books and a library run by volunteers.

It is significant that these three sons: Jimmy Stevenson, Carter Flippo, and Rob Stiles have all participated in our shows. What a wonderful heritage for the Center

and the community!

A year later the Ashland Juniors won \$1,000 in the Community Improvement Award program sponsored by the Sears Company. More renovations! The Club worked at the Camptown races selling programs and handing out awards with the money going to the Center. There were years of hard work in the 70's and 80's. My husband and I both served on the Center Board. Later rooms were rented and activities such as Cotillion brought in money.

It took a village to make our dreams come true. What makes me happy is seeing the kids that were babies and toddlers of our club members are now grown up and are now parents themselves. I see them and this third generation in the Variety Show and the Railroad Run and in the Fourth of July parade. We raised some wonderful citizens and a lot of growing up was done in this wonderful building. The present Board and workers should be proud of what they have accomplished in the past 50 years.

Randolph-Macon College and our Ashland Musical Variety Show

The cast, audience, and sponsors of the Ashland Musical Variety Show would like to express our appreciation for the nearly – four-decades-long history of support and involvement of Randolph-Macon College in our performances.

In 1982, RMC alumni, Harold Wright and Rosanne Shalf, and Nancy Hugo and Sue Watson, faculty wife, asked Dr. Ladell Payne, then President of the College, to have our community show/fundraiser presented on the College campus in Blackwell Auditorium. Not only did he say yes, but he wrote a satirical skit in the form of a mock college cabinet meeting using Gilbert and Sullivan tunes. The parodies poked fun at the Town, the College, and especially the R-MC administration. As President Payne subsequently observed, "Neither music nor satire has been the same since."

Even after the opening of the College's performing arts center with a black-box theater situated on the Blackwell stage, Randolph-Macon continued to allow us to take this structure apart to accommodate our large cast and to re-create an orchestra pit needed for our show. Now the College has completed the renovation of Blackwell Auditorium within the new Center for the Performing Arts. We appreciate the continuing support, cooperation, and patience of the College leadership: President Robert Lindgren; the Fine Arts and Drama Departments and their students; and Campus Safety.

Ashlanders and Hanoverians consider themselves fortunate to live in a place where we can regularly enjoy the cultural and athletic events that RMC brings to our community. We value those who live in the greater Ashland/Hanover area who have Randolph-Macon connections and who either perform on stage or clap enthusiastically from the audience when we present our Ashland Musical Variety Show. 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History of the Ashland Musical Variety Show

In 1982, a small group gathered in Nancy Hugo's kitchen to figure out a fund-raising project for the Hanover Arts and Activities Center. The project became the Ashland Musical Variety Show. First done in 1982, then in 1983, and every odd year since. From the beginning, the decision was made that this show was not a talent show. Anyone from kindergarten age and up can sign up to be in certain numbers that have become standards.

The first show, called "We Are Family," was led by Nancy Hugo as Stage Manager, Rosanne Shalf with props and costumes, Tom Bass, as Master of Ceremonies and Sue Watson and Herald Wright as Producers/Directors. This Ashland area tradition has continued – always sponsored by the Hanover Arts and Activities Center, and in March every other year. In 2003, Lorie Foley has joined Sue Watson as Directors/Producers of this show. This year, Carolyn Peart joined Sue as Show Chair/Co-producer.

From the beginning, each show has been performed at Blackwell Auditorium on the campus of Randolph-Macon College, and Duncan Memorial United Methodist Church has served as our "backstage." The Ashland Musical Variety Show is truly dependent on hundreds of volunteers and the strong leadership of the Executive Director and the Board of the Hanover Arts & Activities Center to come to fruition.

For the 1983 show, Marion Herget wrote lyrics and Dougee Zeno wrote the music for our show's Finale – "Ashland, Ashland." Until his death, Mayor Dick Gillis would come on stage and lead the finale. This special song captures the spirit of the show and our town.

Enjoy the accolades! You deserve to celebrate "what I (you) did for love." I love you! Lorie



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
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
